Dear Friends,

This year the month of May is punctuated by two major festivals. The first of these is Pentecost, often known as the birthday of the Church. It is that, of course, but to contemplate the action of the Holy Spirit must never be to confine God's grace revealed in this way to just a time and place event. Yes, it is in some ways the 'kick-start' to the Church which enables the disciples to rush into that crowded street when the Holy Spirit descends on them during that first PENTECOST. Yet the Holy Spirit is central to creation itself; it is also the dynamic force which we pray directs the Church. In this sense, the Church should not be regarded as just another institution, but imbued with God's driving force. So we as Christians have an understanding that it is the Spirit which directly links us to God through Jesus Christ.

The second great festival is TRINITY SUNDAY - the opportunity to contemplate the mystery and breadth of God's love revealed in Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In fact, as a feast day it is relatively late in terms of Church history, and an English archbishop important in its promotion. Thomas Becket was consecrated on the Sunday after Whitsun (Pentecost) in 1162 and instituted a yearly remembrance of this in honour of the Trinity. Eventually this spread to the whole Western Church!

Trinity Sunday is often known as the 'graveyard' of many a sermon, sometimes justly! However, I think that it does give us pause to just seek to 'catch up' with the wonder of this breadth of love of which I have spoken. Truly, there can no adequate human understanding of such love. All we can do is seek to be caught up in the vision of God's glory; to be formed within it and long for our ultimate incorporation into it. The great (and sadly short-lived) Catholic theologian Catherine LaCugna talks of the doctrine of the Trinity (a specifically Christian way of speaking about God) as a summarisation of what it means to participate in the life of God through Jesus Christ, in the Spirit.

At the risk of ending up in the 'graveyard' myself, our Trinitarian faith is more an **affirming** of the desire of God to reveal love in its fullest in drawing humanity and creation itself into deepest possible communion. From this flows **our** own desire to respond to that love. The contemplation of the Trinity should enable us to live lives in which this communion floods every aspect of our own interaction with creation in the widest sense.

I am sure that many will know Andrei Rublev's great icon of the Trinity, painted in the early 1400s. Abraham's divine visitors (Genesis 18: 1-8) - their wings touching in tender interaction - are portrayed around a table as a visible expression of this drawing into the Divine Love. The side of the table facing us is open, and Father, Son and Holy Spirit long for us to participate ever more deeply in this **agape** - this love feast - of which the Eucharist is the foretaste.

EASTER. Sincere thanks to all who participated in our shared journey through Holy Week and Easter. We started that journey on Palm Sunday with a palm procession down Church Street and around the south side of the church before entering the church through the west door and this set the scene for the rest of the week. The performance of Stainer's devotion, 'The Crucifixion' that evening was much appreciated by all those present and I am grateful to Andrew Wilson and those who sang in the choir. Keeping the Triduum - the three great dayswith a lovely Service of Light (complete with a party and sparklers!). We reached Easter Day and rejoiced in the Resurrection of Our Lord in a beautifully decorated church. Many thanks to our great flower arrangers, musicians, ringers, sidespeople et al!

VISITING PREACHERS. We have two visiting preachers at our 9.45 Eucharist during May. On **Sunday 8th May** Canon Geoff Daintree will be with us to remind us about Christian Aid Week (15th- 21st May). Geoff worships at St Mary's Willingdon, having previously been vicar of St John's, Meads, Eastbourne. However, he now works for Christian Aid as their church advocacy advisor and his sermons are always thought-provoking and relevant.

TRINITY SUNDAY (22ND MAY). On our patronal festival, the preacher will be Canon Dr Rosemarie Mallett, Vicar, St John's Angell Town, Brixton. Rosemarie is the Public Policy Advisor to the Bishop of Southwark, Chair of Affirming Catholicism and a member of the General Synod. As if that were not enough, Rosemarie is also a single mum and describes her journey thus: "Born in Barbados, I have travelled many routes to arrive as an urban parish priest in London, starting out as a historian of the Caribbean, Africa & black Britain, then moving on first to Africa and then home to the Caribbean to work as a development sociologist; then all change in a move to London to work as a senior medical sociologist and ethno-cultural mental health research scientist, and through community activism and church engagement, somehow finding the path from academia to becoming a parish priest and mother of one. Nothing was lost on the journey.

Now I find myself very engaged in church development locally and nationally, still dealing with issues of justice and equity for women and minority ethnic people in church and outside. There's still a long road to travel... wellies on and marching forward.... "

So, two people who will enrich our Christian journey through the month of May. It would be great to see a good number at both services.

ASCENSION DAY, There will be a Sung Eucharist on **Thursday 5th May at 7.30pm** to celebrate the Lord's Ascension. This was a lovely occasion last year, so please do come if you are able to. There will be some refreshments after the service to celebrate!

TRINITY SUNDAY - 22ND MAY, As you see above, **Our patronal festival** falls on 22nd May. After the 9.45 there will be a **Bring and Share Lunch** in the Old School. A sign-up list will appear in the north porch at some stage and you may even find yourself approached! Please do come if you can. It would be great to see as many of the church family together as possible.

FLOWERS FOR THE QUEEN, We shall be celebrating the Queen's 90th birthday with an array of flowers in the church on the Trinity weekend with different arrangements illustrating different decades of Her Majesty's life. The church will be open **Saturday 21st May (10am-4.00pm) and Sunday 22nd May (11.30pm-5.30pm)** In addition, tea/coffee & cake (£3.00) will be served in The Old School on Saturday: 6.10am-12pm & 2-4pm. Entrance to the church is free although we would welcome donations towards church funds. Please do help us to make this widely known.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK. As already mentioned, this takes place 15th – 21st May. We had a great cake baking jamboree last year, and, with an amazing street collection, raised a super amount of money for this important charity. This year in addition to the street collection we are holding a sharing of talents event at a simple lunch on Pentecost Sunday (15th May) If you think that you have a talent you could share, please write it, together with your name and contact details, and put it in a box at the back of church. You will find other details elsewhere. Young and old, there is no age restriction to sharing your gifts!

SAMARA'S AID. Obviously, I am writing this some time in advance of the result of our appeal to support this charity which does wonderful work in the refugee camps in and surrounding Syria. However, may we thank you in advance. Next month we will share the news of how the appeal fared.

ADVANCED NOTICE A date for your diaries – Bishop Mark will be presiding and preaching at our 9.45am Parish Eucharist on Sunday 19th June. Again, please do spread the word. I hope for a good number in church.

THE ROOF. You will have noticed that there is some restriction on entering the grassed area immediately adjacent to the north nave. During a heavy storm we lost several stones from the roof. At present, investigations are being made as to the general condition of this north face. I keep catching sight in the vestry of the plaque commemorating the 'rehealing' of the church roof (plus the tower and the porch roof) in the 1920s at a cost of just over £2,000! Our church is one of the largest in the county roofed entirely with Horsham stone. We will obviously have to wait to see what is required, particularly as we had already hoped to tackle worn areas of stonework, mostly on the tower. Our beautiful church will always require careful maintenance due to its antiquity and exposed site.

THE PROCESSIONAL CROSS. I would like to thank the Friends of Holy Trinity for the restoration of the processional cross which was looking rather tired. I believe that this was originally presented to mark the incumbency of Canon Cooper (Vicar 1888-1909). The silversmith who restored it remembered working on it in the past (although not as far back as 1909!)

OUR NEW HYMNBOOKS. You will have noticed that we have now gone red on the hymnbook front – nothing to do with politics! The old hymnbook really had reached the end of practical use, and after deliberation the PCC decided to adopt the new Ancient & Modern 2013 book. It has a much larger range of modern hymnody and also better 'reworkings' of many old favourites than the old book. The major cost of the new book has been covered by two gifts 'in memoriam,' for which we are most grateful.

Welcome to the Lord's Table As I wrote last month, a number of our young people are preparing for their First Holy Communions in July. Please hold them in your prayers. Also, don't forget that we will be holding a confirmation course in the Autumn – a great opportunity for those who are not confirmed at present to affirm their faith.

STEWARDSHIP & FUND RAISING

Thank you very much for Maintaining a Stir last year. This is an update following the Parish letter and article in the 2015 Christmas magazine. We had a very good Christmas at Holy Trinity. The Christmas Tree Festival generated a record income of £11,2518.19 with approximately 3,500 visitors, and services and other events were also well attended. The financial results for 2015 were good as can be seen in the recently published church accounts and the diocesan loan has now been reduced to £50k.

- LOVE EVERY NEIGHBOUR - CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 15-21 MAY

In Marcus Borg's book, "The Heart of Christianity", he poses an interesting question: "What would life be like on earth if God were king and the rulers of the world were not?" I have no doubt He would make sure there were systems in place to help those who could not help themselves: He would ensure no one would ever starve; no one would be homeless; those who were marginalized and on the fringes of society would be made to feel they belonged; no one would feel lonely. Everyone could live their life with purpose and dignity, in a world free from worry and sorrow.

An ideal world? Perhaps. But one that would be possible if everyone bought into it. We should buy into it; it's what we pray in the prayer Jesus gave us, "Thy kingdom come, they will be done on *earth*, as it is in heaven."

Christian Aid works globally for profound change that eradicates the causes of poverty, striving to achieve equality, dignity and freedom for all, regardless of faith or nationality. Christian Aid provides urgent, practical and effective assistance where need is great, not only tackling the effects of poverty but its root causes as well empowering people to take control of their lives.

Jesus gave us a clear message, "Love your neighbour as yourself." (Mat 22:39) And he told us how to do it: : "Feed the hungry, give shelter to the homeless, clothe the naked, help the ill, visit those in prison." (Mat 25:35-37). His message was clear: "Love your neighbour as yourself" (Mat 22:39)

The life of many people round the world is marked by daily anguish; a constant worry about providing enough food for the family; of anxiety about illness with no medical facilities; of a sense of hopelessness and no way out; of children suffering.

People like Morsheda whose life is a constant battle. Living with her four children on a low-lying island on the Brahmaputra river, floods are a terrifying part of her everyday life. The single room, corrugated-iron shack they live in has been flooded four times. One year they had less than an hour to flee for safety as huge waves crashed against their house. Hastily she made a raft from a banana tree

and put her youngest child in a cooking pot. "Everything was shaking because of the wind. I saw the river right in front of my eyes. My children were so scared. My sister was holding them very tightly and we were panicking because our neighbour's child was washed away."

Each year the floods threaten to sweep away the little she has. Without livestock and a safe place to tend animals and grow crops, the only income Morsheda has is from doing hard manual labour for as little as 74p a day. But her life doesn't have to be like this. Morsheda's neighbour, Feroza has been helped by Christian Aid to create an earth plinth 8 ft above water level which has given her a safe place to rebuild her house, enabled her to buy a goat, ducks, chickens, vegetable seeds and a composting wormery; all safely out of the reach of future floods. Not only this but she has since turned her original investment into assets worth ten times the original amount. Day by day her income and her confidence increase. "What I have received from Christian Aid has changed my life. I never dreamed of it. I think it is a blessing." She is now even saving money to move to the mainland where a brighter future awaits.

Thanks to our response, the lives of our neighbours, like Feroza and Morsheda are being transformed. This is what loving our neighbour looks like.

There are a number of ways you can support the work of Christian Aid this Christian Aid Week:



NEWS FROM ANDREW WHITE

I am in Israel. The Israelis are not one people, they are not even particularly religious as people. The Israelis are both Jews and Arabs and I love them both. And despite what people say, on the whole they love and respect each other.

Since ISIS swept through the plains of Nineveh in the summer of 2014, the genocide of Christians in Iraq has escalated. Despite the Obama Administration's recent acknowledgement of this fact, the response from the international community has been muted. Indeed, the abandonment of the Iraqi Christian community represents a sad decline in The West's empathy for persecuted minorities.

The Foundation for Relief and Reconciliation in the Middle East continues to work on the front line. We are currently sheltering 500 Christian Iraqi refugee families in Jordan. Most of these people have fled ISIS, who decree that all Christians living in its territory convert to its version of Islam, pay a tax (known as a Jizya), or be killed. Unsurprisingly, many of Iraq's Christians have fled their homeland, with many of them now living lives of privation in neighbouring Arab countries, clinging to the hope that things might one day get better.

As well as our Iraqi refugees in Jordan, we continue to support the medical clinic at St George's in Baghdad, and provide a food relief programme through the church. We are also providing emergency relief to thousands of Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in Northern Iraq. The people there have lost everything - their homes, their possessions, and in many cases, their loved ones. Those who are considered "fortunate" live in disused military trailers or tents provided by the UNHCR. Food is scarce and provided for by a dwindling number of international NGOs, of which FRRME is one.

Given the enormous scale of the emergency we are facing, I am writing to you, our much-valued supporters, to ask for a donation. Every act of generosity you make is greatly valued by those we are helping. Your donations will fund food voucher programmes, vital medical care, schooling for the children,

and emergency shelter. Donations will also be used to fund our international school of reconciliation in Jerusalem this year, which will introduce a new generation of peace makers to the power and methods of interfaith dialogue.

We must face up to the reality of the suffering of our brothers and sisters in Christ. The persecution of the church in the Middle East is a daily reality but your support makes all the difference. As I often say, we must pray for peace, but we must also pay for peace. Through our shared love of the body of Christ, please partner with us this Easter. 

GARDEN NOTES FOR MAY

As I write we have had a fair few April showers with hail, thunder and lightning but air temperatures are still on the cool side for this time of year so the grass is not growing away madly. A few bluebells are beginning to bloom so the woodlands will probably be at their best end of April beginning of May.

May is often "manic" if you have a veg. garden with all the jobs that need to be done. Sow runner and French beans, sweetcorn, courgettes, squashes all of which can safely be planted out with other frost tender plants (e.g. bedding plants) the third week of May. Hanging baskets may be hung up a week or so earlier being off the ground and often sheltered by buildings. Plant up tubs/ pots and cover fences and trellis with annual climbers like Cobea scandens, Ipomea, Mina (Ipomea) lobata, Rhodochiton, Eccremocarpus scaber, Asarina antirrhinum and even the humble and edible nasturtium - though watch for caterpillars (they are the cabbage butterfly family).

Plant out brassicas, leeks, lettuce and sow more carrots, beetroot and spinach. Maincrop potatoes should be in the ground by May and the first earlies showing signs of emerging.

In the greenhouse, when tomato and cucumber plants are established, remove side shoots (unless they are bush varieties). Don't feed until the first truss has set, as too much fertiliser/nutrients encourages lots of leaf at the expense of flower and fruit formation. Once set however, feed well and regularly with a well balanced NPK fertiliser (e.g.Tomorite or maxicrop / seaweed based ones).

Lawns can still be treated for weeds in early May but granular treatments need watering in if there's no rain after 3-4 days to avoid scorch (always read manufacturers instructions!) Asparagus growers will be cutting (and eating) spears regularly by May but watch for asparagus beetle and pick off swiftly. Keep a vigilant eye out for other pests and diseases - aphids on roses, sweet peas, broad beans, lupins etc and treat as organically as possible.

Tie in climbers as they grow (e.g. clematis, honeysuckle and sweet peas). Some biennials flower this month notably sweet williams, honesty and hollyhocks. You can either save seed from them for sowing June/July in trays, or let them self sow and move the plants if in the wrong place. Large leaved houseplants that may look a little dusty may be put outside on a warm rainy day to have a good wash down...if moveable without breaking your back! Do not leave them outside in bright sunlight as this can easily scorch their leaves. Pot on any houseplants whose roots are bursting the boundaries of their pots. Tease out any really tangled roots or cut them off if that is difficult. Root pruning in summer will do little harm.

OVER PROVISION OF HOUSING FOR COMMON BIRDS *By Mike Russell of the Sussex Wildlife Trust*

Some of you may have nestboxes in your garden and hopefully by the time you read this they are buzzing with activity, blue tits or great tits frantically ferrying mouthfuls of juicy caterpillars to the mouths of the ever-hungry chicks. It's great to watch this for two weeks or so before the chicks fledge and then they emerge into their new world, in a good year this can be up to a dozen or so, and then the parents can relax, job done for another year. Your garden has provided a habitat and conditions where these wonderful little birds can thrive.

But is it right to provide these facilities on a nature reserve? An interesting debate has been going on at Woods Mill nature reserve, Henfield over the last few years as to whether providing a number of nestboxes for blue and great tits, plus winter feeding, has produced an artificially high number of these two species. Undoubtedly, when we have done surveys of the populations here they have come out as very dense and have on occasions been questioned when we have submitted them to the British Trust for Ornithology for being unusually high.


Since we set up the nestbox scheme blue tit and great tit numbers have continually risen, but in that time we have lost both willow tit and more recently marsh tit while coal tit sightings have declined. It is thought that that the blue and great tits are more aggressive and will out compete the other species for nesting sites and also for food put out for them in winter. Undoubtedly there are other reasons why the populations of the scarcer tits have declined and there is no science yet to prove the theory of competing, and it does show that blue and great tits are better at adapting to a changing environment.

But it is not just the scarcer tits that these high populations might affect. One of the advantages of being a resident here is that you get into your breeding cycle early and are well into the swing of it before the summer migrants arrive. So while the visitors are still getting established, the blue and great tits are feasting on all the emergent insects, particularly caterpillars, therefore by the time the migrant chicks are ready to be fed, the food source has been depleted. Again, nothing proven and there are many other causes for general declining summer migrant numbers, especially in south east England.

I'm not for a minute suggesting that you stop feeding or remove nestboxes from your garden, they are really important for these birds. In the bigger picture, there are other factors that are the major causes of population declines, but at places like Woods Mill it may be that we, in fact we already have, scale down the nesting provision to help more of those species that are struggling to cope in an ever shrinking suitable environment.

FROM THE CUCKFIELD MAGAZINE MAY 1916 PARISH NOTES

THE EASTER FESTIVAL.-We can look back upon the Easter Festival with feelings of satisfaction and great thankfulness. There were very good congregations at all the services and there were altogether 443 Communicants. The services were reverent and hearty, the musical parts being rendered in a manner which reflected great credit on the Organist and the Choir.

Our hearty thanks are due to the kind friends who sent such a profusion of lovely flowers, and to the ladies who so kindly and effectively decorated the Church. A word of thanks is also certainly due to the children, who brought a large number of bunches of primroses, which were very useful.

At Ansty there was a Celebration of Holy Communion at 7 a.m., at which there were 35 Communicants, and there were 14 Communicants at Brook Street at 6 a.m.

THE EASTER OFFERING at the Parish Church, together with the contributions from Ansty and Brook Street, amounted to no less than £105 ls. 4d. This was a magnificent and most generous gift, and the Vicar wishes to take this opportunity of expressing his very sincere thanks to his parishioners for their great generosity, and to assure them that he highly appreciates the gift, not only because of the great monetary value of it but also because of the goodwill and kind feeling which prompted it.

THE EASTER VESTRY was held at the Church Room on Wednesday, April 26th, at 7.30 p.m., and passed off very well, though we wish that there had been a larger attendance of members of the congregation. An account of the proceedings has appeared in the local press, but we may state that the Churchwardens' accounts showed a balance in hand of a little over £ 20, which was quite satisfactory, considering the fact that there have been some heavy expenses during the past year, and it reflects great credit on our Chancellor of the Exchequer.

THE CRECHE.-We are asked to remind our readers that a Crèche or Day Nursery for Children has just been opened at Richmond Villa, Whiteman's Green, where mothers can leave their children for the day, from 8 a.m. till 6 p.m., on payment of 4d. for one child, 6d. for two, and 8d. for three. The children are well and kindly cared for, and this charge includes breakfast, dinner and tea. We feel sure that in these days, when there is such a demand for women's work, this nursery will be a great boon to mothers who wish to go out to work and to be sure that their little ones are happy and well cared for. The Nursery, which will well repay a visit, is open for inspection on Wednesdays and Fridays, between 2 and 5 p.m.
