My dear friends,

Have you ever basked in the afterglow of an event? Easter is not just a day, but a season - the longest in the Church's year, in fact! We are given fifty glorious days of Spring and Summer to prolong our baptismal joy, fifty glorious days of basking in the light of the risen Saviour. This period leads us on a journey of growth in understanding the wonder of the Resurrection Life which Jesus opens to the whole of humanity through his own Resurrection. Contemplating this is part of the Christian's DNA – the very building blocks of our lives as followers of Jesus of Nazareth – the Christ.

Sometimes the journey of faith is not easy, and can be a rocky road or a barren desert. There is nothing wrong with this! We are human, yet our Faith teaches us that ultimately the Divine Love of God dwells within and travels with us every inch of the way in the face of Jesus Christ.

One of the set of readings used during this season is the Song of Solomon. In the original Hebrew (and perhaps composed about 1000BC) the Song is composed of lyrical poems and may have originally intended to be sung. At first reading, a person will be surprised at the nature of the work, a series of love poems – secular (God is never mentioned, although the 'flame' mentioned (8:6) is sometimes taken as God's presence), erotic and passionate in nature.

Yet this extraordinary imagery has enriched Christianity - part of our scripture since the earliest formation of the canon. Our Faith has taken the Song as allegorical and approached it in many ways through the centuries. The figure of the bridegroom or male lover is seen as representing Christ, whilst the female voice represents the individual believer's soul. It can also represent the relationship between Christ and the Church. Many Christian mystics such as Teresa of Avila, St John of the Cross, Bernard of Clairvaux and Gregory of Nyssa have found great inspiration in the work, using its evocative power, and celebrating a mystical divine-human union rather than human erotic love.

Continuing to rejoice in the Resurrection Life we are drawn into, John of the Cross uses the imagery of the Song of Songs to inspire his beautiful poem, 'The Living Flame of Love,' the last verse of which says:

How gently and lovingly you wake in my heart, where in secret you dwell alone; and in your sweet breathing, filled with good and glory, how tenderly you swell my heart with love.

Dear Friends,

'Thy Kingdom Come' is a phrase that trips off the tongue of Christians every time they pray the Lord's Prayer. It sums up the purpose of Jesus and of his body, The Church. LITTLE ONES



Welcome to Little Ones! We are a group who meet on the first Tuesday of each month. The group is for pre-school age children, babies and their carers. We meet at 11.00am in the vestry behind the organ for 30 minutes for songs, stories and a chat. We are also joined by a wonderful team of students from Warden Park Academy who are part of a kindness committee team at the school.

Little Ones starts with a welcome followed by singing happy birthday to those who have had or have got a birthday in that and Twinkle Twinkle Little Star. In the last few months we wished one of leaders a very happy significant birthday and two of our little ones had their first birthday.

A story is then told by Alison who is helped by Fluffy the cat. Alison either chooses a story from the bible or a story with a message such as being kind to one each other and learning to listen. Each story encourages the children to be involved and join in with the actions.

After that, we sing some songs and play action games. In recent months the children have enjoyed getting to know the song Jesus Love is very wonderful". Finally we all say a prayer before we sit down to have a chat and a well-deserved drink and biscuit provided by our team from Warden Park.

At the March meeting of the Mothers' Union, David and Andra from Dementia Friends came to tell us about the work of that group, which is an Alzeimer's Society Initiative. There are about three hundred Dementia Alliiances in England, and all of these groups welcome volunteers to give support to people with dementia and their families. Both Andra and David had had a husband or wife who suffered from Alzheimers, and consequently they spoke with genuine experience and compassion. There are many types of dementia, and research is going on to discover what causes the brain cells to die. Everyone with dementia is different, and younger people also who have family and work responsibilities can be affected too. Alzeimers is the most common form of dementia.

Dementia Friends is about turning understanding into action. We were asked what comes into our minds when we think of dementia? Almost everyone had some experience or knew someone with Alzheimers, and we talked about common features such as forgetfulness and confusion, the inability to organise or do simple tasks which we all take for granted – such as the sequence and actions needed to make a cup of tea. Memories of the past become clearer than what is happening day to day, social skills can become lost, and these restrict opportunities for going out or going away. It is common to lose perception of safety and danger, and hence a carer can become needed at all times.

Andra and David emphasised that a key message of Dementia Friends is that it is possible to live well with dementia, but this has to depend so much on the resources of the family, or often the wife or husband as the lone carer. It needs to be understood that the progression of the disease is usually downwards, but the carer's skills and energy remain the same, or possibly decline, and consequently there can come a time when the dementia needs become too demanding for the carer to cope indefinitely. Families can reach a difficult time when it is recognised that more or different care is needed for the one who lives with dementia.

Haywards Heath Dementia Action Alliance was set up in 2016, and they produce a helpful leaflet giving a timetable of various groups and meetings, and further information is available from Haywards Heath Town Council on 01444 455694. For our members it was an interesting and thought provoking meeting with Andra and David, and we were grateful for their time, information and sharing of experience.

MISSION GIVING UPDATE

FAMILY SUPPORT WORK, CHARITY NO. 285337

Family Support Work is one of the three charities in Sussex that we support as a church from our Mission and Charities' budget, and here is a little bit more about what goes on behind the FSW food box in the porch.

The charity was founded in 1890 to support vulnerable children and their families in times of crisis and need arising from unemployment, poor quality housing, mental health issues, learning or disability difficulties, abuse in the home or inability to afford food and clothing. The food box in the porch is generously filled, week after week, with non-perishable food stuffs and good quality clothing, which are distributed by our deanery worker Caroline, who currently sees twenty families in our area. The families supported include offenders, asylum seekers and refugees, substance abusers, minority ethnic groups, and children and young people at risk.

Over 100 families are supported each year, involving about 300 children, with one-to-one care to help resolve the family difficulties and rebuild the life of the family.

Community-based work is focussed mainly on deprived coastal areas and isolated rural areas in Sussex. In Hastings the worker has a thriving cooking club which helps families cook everyday food from basic principles and then join in the lunch with their young children.

Our deanery committee fund-raises to support Caroline, with various church events such as beetle drives, quizzes and murder-mystery suppers. The main event of the year is the Spring Supper with entertainment in March which has been so well supported by our congregation over many years.

There are yellow gift aid envelopes for donations in the porch and a visit to the website (familysupportwork.org) will supply further information.

FSW NEWS — AN UPDATE ON OUR WORK



We welcome our new Play worker Monika to the team; she is helping to run After School Clubs in East Sussex. During the February half term, FSW's Play Team ran Family Activity days in Mid Sussex and West Sussex, and a group of families from East Sussex enjoyed a day trip to Blackberry Farm.

FSW intensively supports children and families through difficult times in their lives, whether they are facing poverty, ill health, disability, bereavement, family break- up or domestic abuse. We have 8 Family Support Workers, a Play Team of 4, and many wonderful volunteers who help families and who fundraise for FSW. We continue to cover urban, rural and coastal areas across the Diocese.

A story from one of our Workers illustrates the impact our work makes on families we support.

Single parent Sophie had been struggling with mental health difficulties since the breakup of her marriage and a job loss. She had low self-esteem, mild agoraphobia and had become dependent on prescription medication. She and her son Daniel were very isolated. Daniel also had communication difficulties and was receiving support from a specialist service.

After a few months of working with the family, Sophie started to trust me. With much encouragement, the family came on a supported break with FSW and this was a turning point for them. Normally reclusive, joining a large group of people was daunting. However, with support, they coped well, participating in all the activities and Daniel even made a friend. They had become reliant on each other for emotional support, so I felt it was vital they engaged with other people for their overall wellbeing.

Soon afterwards Sophie and Daniel participated in group activities I was running in their area and began to make connections with the other families.

After a year of working intensively with them, Sophie started to look for work and eventually found a job. This was transformational for the family in terms of mental wellbeing and financial security. After a lot of patience and nurturing they really have turned a corner and a measure of their success is that they no longer need to see me so much!

1000S OF CROSSES

I am sure many of you will have noticed and appreciated the six kneelers which follow the curve of the altar rail. They provide comfort for worship as well as combining artistry with theology. I wonder, have you made the links which unite the textile decoration and the original building? This article explains and celebrates, as well as thanking, those who worked hard towards the achievement (despite their modesty).



The story began as part of the church refurbishment plan and, as with many aspects of Holy Trinity Church life, these kneelers were a team effort.

The original measurements were taken by Colin Sewell-Rutter, and Pat Montague co-ordinated the project. The company Jacksons of Hebden Bridge provided the materials, and from photos of the church, ideas were transferred on to canvas ready for 1000's of cross stitches and as many woman hours. The team of willing stitchers comprised Sue Cutler, Liz Graydon, Sue Hibling, Ros Longfield, Daphne Stuart, Ros Thunder and Josie Wright, and Helen Puxley who did the upholstery.

The bright sunlight through the East window inspired the rich blue background and choice of other colours. The words 'Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty, God in Three Persons, Blessed Trinity (Reginald Heber 1826) are boldly stitched in capital letters on the edges facing the congregation. The Holy Trinity 'logo,' echoed in the trefoil window and chairbacks, appears in the centre of the four straight kneelers.



Each corner kneeler has the fleur de lys in its centre and a scroll pattern on front and back edges —all of which can be seen in the chancel tiles.



There is an intended order to the layout and reading the symbols as they appear from left to right we see: the Alpha and Omega, the Lamb of God, symbols for the apostles Matthew and Mark (man and lion), the paten with communion wafer, the corn, the grapes and the chalice, symbols for the apostles Luke and John (ox and eagle), the baptismal/pilgrim shell and the dove. All the images can be found somewhere in the church - many appearing in the stained glass windows. Happy hunting!

Many sincere thanks to everyone involved. With good stewardship from us all, these kneelers will survive many of us.

We, on the Christmas Tree Festival Organising Committee, feel that it is important to allow the Festival to grow and mature. Only two of the original committee members still serve and they are nearly fifteen years older than when they began!

We have a Committee meeting about once a month from February to December. We all have duties throughout the year from liaising with the tree growers to making sure our equipment is fit for purpose, legal and safe. On the week before the Festival and for clearing away afterwards we are all on hand to "do our bit", taking delivery of the trees, welcoming decorators, maintaining a friendly atmosphere during the

Festival and giving the church a final sweep when that last tree has left the building.

Along the way we have some serious discussions and a lot of fun. 

Through our partnership with four churches in Jordan, we are supporting hundreds of Iraqi Christian families who have fled to Amman and are waiting for asylum in the West (a process which can take up to 3 years). In addition to monthly food packages, we also provide money for sheltered accommodation.



As a registered charity we operate within the framework set out by the Charity Commission for England and Wales (our charity number is 1133576). As a registered charity, your donations also qualify for Gift Aid. In 2016, we raised an additional £108,511 in Gift Aid from the donations made to us. This money equates to an extra 650 emergency food packages per month.

FROM CUCKFIELD PARISH MAGAZINE MAY 1917 PARISH NOTES

The Easter Festival – We can again look back to Easter with feelings of great thankfulness, though it is the third time that we have kept it m the midst of this terrific war which has brought anxiety and grief to so many hundreds of thousands of homes. The total number of Communicants during the day was 398, less than last year. The services throughout the day were, however, very well attended and they were very hearty.

Fire in the Church - We may well be thankful for the preservation of our beautiful Church and Spire from the danger which threatened them on the evening of Easter Day. It was providential that the fire was discovered before it had taken serious hold of the woodwork, so that it was possible to extinguish it with comparative ease. There is no doubt that if it had spread it would have been practically impossible to extinguish it at all, and we may well tremble to think of what the results would have been. We are thankful for the promptitude and presence of mind shewn by the Clerk, Mr. Browne, and for the energetic and efficient action taken by Mr. W. E. Mitchell, the Sidesmen and (named)others. The Service on the evening of Low Sunday was a fitting conclusion to our Easter Festival, being an expression of thanksgiving for the preservation of the Church, for the great successes gained by our brave troops on the Western Front and in Palestine, and for the Message of Easter

The Easter Offering, including the contributions from the Mission Churches, amounted to no less than £131 13s. 4d., and the Vicar wishes to express his most sincere thanks to all his friends for this splendid gift, and his great appreciation of the kindness and generosity which has been shown to him ever since he came to Cuckfield.

The Easter Vestry Meeting was held on Friday in Easter Week and there was a very fair attendance of members of the congregation. As a full account of the meeting has appeared in the public Press. we need not say more than that the Churchwardens' accounts shewed a slight deficit, though we must not forget that during the year very generous contributions

have been made to Societies which are carrying on religious and philanthropic work, and to different War Appeals. We are glad to say that Mr. B. Y. Bevan again accepted the nomination of the Vicar to act as his Warden, and Mr. W. E. Mitchell, to whom the parish is greatly indebted for many years of loyal and good work, was again chosen to represent the parish.. The Vicar also asked that someone should be appointed to audit the accounts of the Sick and Poor Fund and the various Clubs connected with the Church and Schools, and Mr. E. M. Preston has kindly consented to act in this capacity.

The Roll of Honour – We wish to express our sincere sympathy with Mrs. Tom Henley, of Ansty; after many months of anxious and weary suspense she has received the official notification of the death of her husband, **Private T. Henley**, Royal Sussex Regiment. It is presumed that he was killed in action on 30th June, 1916. It is also with great regret that we have to record that Second Lieutenant **R. S. L. Worsley**, of the Royal Flying Corps, has been missing since the 13th April. Owing to the recent severe fighting in the various fronts, casualty lists have been very heavy, and among the wounded are four Cuckfield men: Sergeant Fred Beard, Rifleman J. Bransden, Private F. H. Botting and Private J. W. Stoner. We wish them all a speedy recovery. There has naturally been great anxiety with regard to the safety of others from Cuckfield, but, thankfully, reassuring news has been received.

The National Society – Sunday, May 6th, is the anniversary of the Accession of King George V., and the special Psalms, Lessons and Prayers appointed for the day will be used.

Rogationtide Service –On the evening of Tuesday in Rogation Week, May 15th, we propose to have a procession from the Church and an Open-air Service, which will be held on the open space near the allotments adjoining London Lane. The procession will leave the Church at 6.30 p.m. and we hope that many members of the congregation will join in it. Surely there has never been a time when we have seen how clearly we are dependent upon the goodness of God..


