My dear friends,

A couple of years ago I was visiting Tarragona in Spain. It is a lovely city, and I really enjoyed exploring the fine medieval cathedral, complete with a spectacular organ and magnificent 15th century altar screen. Like many Spanish cathedrals, there is also a lovely cloister, with a beautiful fountain surrounded by a rose garden. It was very lovely, and a place of great peace.

My eye was drawn to a plaque on the cloister wall with many names on it, and it turned out to commemorate hundreds of priests, monks, and nuns of the diocese who were murdered during the Spanish Civil War in the 1930s. Perhaps one of the hidden facts of this brutal period in Spanish history is that nearly 7,000 clergy and members of religious orders perished during the 'Red Terror,' as it is sometimes known. Whilst there were undoubtedly some very unpleasant dealings and responses by some of the hierarchy of the Church on the Republican side, most of those who died were merely devout Christians trying to lead lives of goodness – seeking to serve Jesus.

The terrible deeds committed on both sides, Nationalist and Republican, have left deep and lasting scars. How does society deal with such terrible history? Is it to dig over the same ground again and again? Is it to continually chew on the bones of grievance and hatred? Is true justice every achievable in such a situation, so long after the event?

We live in times of great volatility, where ugly 'voices' on all sorts of fronts are amplified in all sorts of ways, most spectacularly through misusing the tool of social media. At the end of the day, WE, as brothers and sisters in Christ, are called to stand up for justice and peace for all people; to show the overflowing love of God at work within our lives, and to reveal this same love to those we meet as a sign of hope – the ultimate antidote and means of healing to injustice, hatred and intolerance.

FROM THE VICAR'S DESK

Children and Families Lay Ministers Our PCC recently approved the appointment of Helen Swift and Hilary Turner-King as Children and Families Lay Ministers within our parish. I am delighted that we have, as a parish, found the opportunity to allow this to come about. The closure of the Friday youth club several years ago was painful yet necessary, and we have prayerfully explored different avenues of engagement with children and younger families (I trust that everyone, no matter who they are, realises that they are welcome at Holy Trinity). The working group recommended advertising for a part-time post, but with no success until both Helen and Hilary came forward from within our own worshipping community. Both bring great gifts in terms of engagement of this kind, and both will bring different aspects of ministry to their work. I hope that all will be as excited as I am at the prospect of their gifts being used to enable engagement with the wider community. This is a considerable risk in financial terms for the parish - a risk for the Gospel's sake - so I would ask you to pray for this important new venture as we continue to serve Jesus joyfully.

Church Bring and Share Picnic To mark the end of the year for Sunday's Cool together with our entry into the holiday season, please do come to a Bring-and-Share Picnic at Mill Hall Farm, Whiteman's Green (through kind permission of Kate and Jonathan Berry). This takes place on **Sunday 7th July from 12 noon**. We

have been fortunate with the weather over the last couple of years, so fingers crossed! It is always great to gather socially in this way, so please do come along for a lovely occasion.

Lunchtime Recitals We welcome the fine **guitarist Jon Rattenbury** for the Lunchtime Recital on **Friday 5th July at 1.00pm**. Refreshments will be available from 12.30. Please note that there will not be a recital during August, but I will be doing the honours with an organ recital on **Friday 6th September** when they resume. I am also giving a lunchtime organ recital at **All Saints' Hove** on its great 1905 Hill organ on **Thursday 1st August at 1.00 p.m.**, if you fancy a seaside visit!

Our 2019 Cathedral Pilgrimage Do join us for what has become an annual opportunity to travel to one of our southern cathedrals to pray for our parish and generally have a lovely time! This year we visit **Winchester Cathedral on Monday 9th September**. We will have a similar format to previous years: 8.00 a.m., travel by coach from Whitmans Green, coffee and biscuits on arrival, a parish Eucharist at noon in the cathedral and then spare time until our journey back, leaving at 4.00 p.m. Do join us! £22, please book with Gill Squires in the Church Office. Winchester is one of the great Medieval cathedrals - a cradle of English Christianity and monarchy.

Deanery Review Archdeacon Fiona has recently carried out a review of both the Cuckfield and Hurst deaneries. This was an interesting process, with various recommendations regarding closer collaboration within each deanery. There was the hope that within our own deanery Churches Together could be revived in and around Haywards Heath. At present, there is a grouping of conservative-evangelical churches, but no functional gathering for the other mainstream communities. In addition, the prayer groups (called 'clusters') at deanery synod offer greater opportunities for prayer and encouragement within the deanery system. Certainly, the west cluster (including Cuckfield) meets regularly, sharing news, and praying for each parish's endeavours. At present, no boundary changes are contemplated because this is a very expensive process. The report suggests that parish boundaries should be regarded as 'porous' in terms of outreach and supporting ministry, particularly in the new builds rapidly going up around Haywards Heath.

St John of the Cross

Born in 1542 in Fontiveros, Spain, Juan de Yepes y Alvarez, was the son of a rich merchant. His father died when he was very young, leaving his mother to raise the family alone, virtually in penury. Juan, at age 18, began to study with the Jesuits and entered the Carmelite Order in 1563. Ordained in 1567, he met St. Teresa of Avila, and followed her lead in attempting to reform their Order. In 1568, Juan and three other friars began to live a strict monastic life in a small farmhouse. There was hostility from his former brothers who saw his strict discipline as a criticism of their relaxed way of life. In 1576, they had him arrested and imprisoned. It was during this period of imprisonment that John wrote most of his exquisite poetry. He died in 1591. Teresa called John *jiguero de Dios* – God's goldfinch – because he was a small man, and the bird was associated at that time with the Passion of Jesus. His poetry is regarded as one of the high points of Spanish prose. Although any English translation is a pale imitation of the original, nevertheless, we can gain some flavour of the wonderful way in which he sought to draw people to the knowledge of God at work within their lives – a wonderful union. This is perhaps one of his best-known poems:

The Living Flame Of Love

Songs of the soul in the intimate communication of loving union with God.

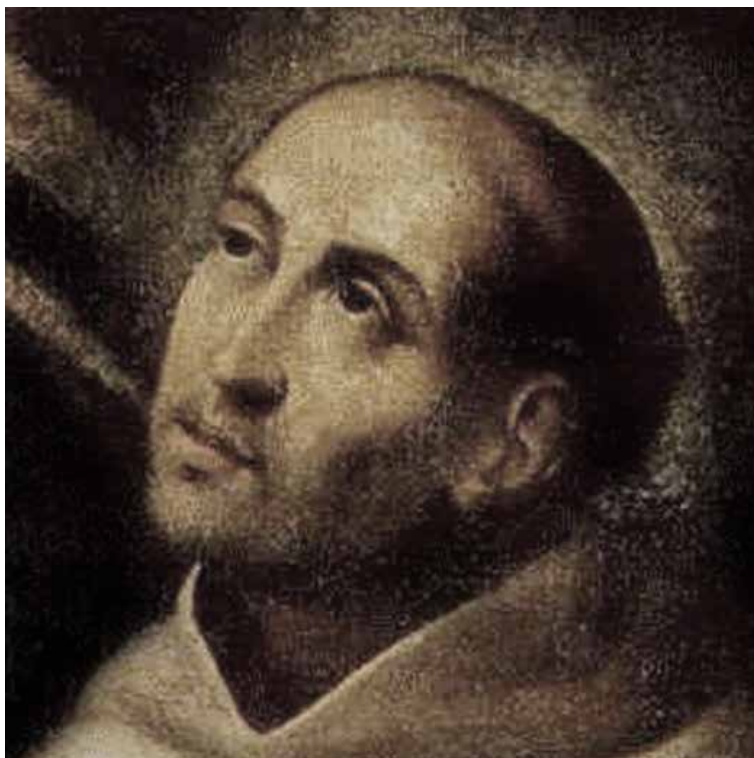
O living flame of love
that tenderly wounds my soul
in its deepest centre! Since
now you are not oppressive,
now consummate! if it be your will:
tear through the veil of this sweet encounter!

O sweet cautery,
O delightful wound!
O gentle hand! O delicate touch
that tastes of eternal life
and pays every debt!
In killing you changed death to life.

O lamps of fire!
in whose splendours
the deep caverns of feeling,

once obscure and blind,
now give forth, so rarely, so exquisitely,
both warmth and light to their Beloved.

How gently and lovingly
you wake in my heart,
where in secret you dwell alone;
and in your sweet breathing,
filled with good and glory,
how tenderly you swell my heart with love.

PROMOTING A SAFER CHURCH

‘The care and protection of children, young people and adults involved in church activities is the responsibility of everyone who participates in the life of the church’

House of Bishops’ Safeguarding Policy

About two years ago the Chichester Diocese introduced a special project for all its Parishes to ensure that within a thorough review of good practice for all church activities there were Policies and Procedures in place for good management and in particular for building and maintaining effective Safeguarding practice.

Holy Trinity met its obligation to reach Level 1 of this project known as ***SIMPLE QUALITY PROTECTS*** by the designated deadline of Easter 2018. The details of this were grouped into 4 areas – **safer activities; safer practice; safer structures and safer people** and are now to be tested in Deanery Chapter this coming September. Levels 2 and 3 of the project will follow.

The matters covered include amongst others - ***first aid provision; risk assessments; parental consent forms for particular activities and photographs; codes of behaviour; recording and reporting systems; contact information; recruitment, induction and training for employees and volunteer helpers***. Now taking this forward The House of Bishops, implementing matters discussed in General Synod, are overlaying this with further guidance.

They state that ***safeguarding means the action the church takes to promote a safer culture in all our churches. in order to achieve this, we all need to do a lot of hard work***”.

Where do I fit in?

While people in certain roles have a mandatory requirement to complete (and renew) Safeguarding Training, others in roles such as Vergers, Servers, Welcomers, caretakers, refreshment Helpers, office staff, sidespersons, flower arrangers, bell ringers, choir members/music group members are all encouraged to do so.

What are we talking about?

CO is a basic Safeguarding awareness course that ***can be completed by any member of the congregation***, to improve their understanding of abuse and enable them to build a culture of informed vigilance within the Church.

www.chichester.anglican.org and go to *Safeguarding then Training*

You will need to register with your own username and password and can then make a start, exit and enter again at will (using your username and password each time of course). When finished, a Certificate will be issued but it is not a test so much as obtaining an understanding of the issues.

I do hope many people will avail themselves of this opportunity to join in and establish the safer culture that is aimed at by The House of Bishops. Several people have already taken this step and do please contact Michael, Robyn Brotherton or me with any concerns or questions, and indeed feedback. I shall be interested to know how you get on.

EVERYDAY DISCIPLESHIP - SUNDAY TO SATURDAY

Setting God's People Free (SGPF) is a programme of change across the Church of England to enable the whole people of God to live out their discipleship confidently, wherever they find themselves, every day of the week. It seeks to liberate and encourage lay ministry both within and outside the church community. When you consider that if we were to spend an average of 10 hours a week on church activities, we would be left with more than 100 waking hours to live out in our homes, schools, communities and places of work. SGPF challenges a culture that over-emphasises a distinction between sacred and secular and moves towards whole-life, all-of-life discipleship.

Life's a Peach not an Orange

Some people think of their Christian life as an orange, divided into separate segments. Some segments will be seen as very important in relation to God, for example going to church, praying, reading the Bible and participating in church-based activities. Other segments may seem less important, such as work, family life, leisure activities or rest. But if we think of

our life as being a peach, a non-segmented fruit, with Christ at the core, then it can really change the way we look at our discipleship. If we believe that **all** life is important to God, then He can use us in **all** places; at home, at school, at the bus stop, in the workplace, in the gym, in the supermarket or wherever we find ourselves in our day to day activities. These places can be described as our **Frontlines**.

The London Institute For Contemporary Christianity (www.licc.org.uk) has a helpful framework, known as the **6Ms**, to enable us to reflect on what God might have been doing already, and to get us thinking about how we might be fruitful on our own frontlines by:

- **M**odelling godly character
- **M**aking good work
- **M**inistering grace & love
- **M**oulding culture
- Being a **M**outhpiece for truth & justice
- Being a **M**essenger of the gospel

Imagine what the impact might be on our neighbourhoods, on our schools and clubs and workplaces, and indeed on our whole nation if all of us were motivated and equipped to make a difference right where we are, on our daily frontlines? There is a great need out there beyond our church walls.

Many of us participated in the **2019 Year of Vocation Lent Course** and were inspired by the stories of people from various backgrounds living out their faith in their daily lives. Over the coming months we will be hearing from members of our congregation as to how they are helping to transform their frontlines and establish God's kingdom here on earth. If you would like to encourage others by sharing **your** story please let me know.

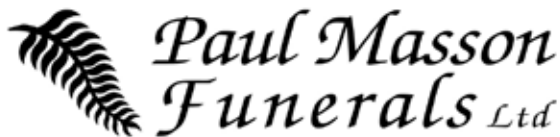

WASTE PREVENTION IN WEST SUSSEX

Now that we are all concerned about environmental issues, it was most enlightening to have an instructive talk by Colin McFarlin who is waste prevention advisor for West Sussex County Council. He and other volunteers help with getting the message across by providing public presentations on all matters regarding recycling. Before 1875 people threw their rubbish out onto the street or on to the fire. In 1875 a Public Health Act was passed stating that bins were to be emptied every week. This process was handed down from government to the counties and then to district councils.

Waste recycling in West Sussex is done by a company called Viridor, a private firm dealing with waste recycling throughout the country. Viridor collects our waste and takes it to Burgess Hill; and from there it goes by lorry to Ford recycling centre. Here all recycling material is placed in enormous drums where it is sorted. Bottles are broken up and other items such as metals are passed through gaps in the drum according to size and substance. Plastic goes on to a conveyor belt and is sorted according to colour and type. Cans go into bales, are sold, and return as new cans in six weeks' time, so there is no need for new material. Everything in the recycling bin is sold, so the result is financial advantage for West Sussex District council.

West Sussex residents throw 30,000 tons of recycling into the wrong bin. If it was done correctly there could be a saving of millions of pounds and would be much better for the environment.

Blue Bins

As far as our bins are concerned, all items placed in the blue bins should be clean and dry, tops and labels removed from bottles and jars. Nothing should be placed in plastic bags.

Milk bottles should be rinsed, tops removed and if possible, collected for charity. Cling film, film from lids trays and pots and crisp packets should not be placed in the blue bin.

Grey Bins

The contents of the grey bins do not go to the recycling centre but to another centre in Horsham, which is the most modern plant in the UK. Here the rubbish is shredded and then it goes on to a conveyor belt in small pieces where paper and plastic are taken out and turned into refuse derived fuel, which is sold mainly to Germany; this does not go into landfill. Metals are also taken out here. Waste for grey bins can be best placed in plastic bags before being collected.

Food waste goes into an anaerobic digester which produces enough energy to power 10,000 homes and is sold back to the National Grid. Only 25% of the contents of our grey bins cannot be recycled and tax is paid on that to the Treasury.

Plastic bags and other plastic items such as the covers for mail and other light plastics including bubble wrap and toilet rolls bags can be placed in special bins found in either Sainsbury's, Waitrose and other supermarkets. This type of plastic can be recycled for years.

Other items

Wood, plastic milk bottle tops are all sold separately. Rags in whatever condition can be taken to a charity shop in a bag tell: them that they are rags, and these they will sell on to be used for padding and filling for items such as car seats.

There were many other tips that Colin gave us that would take too long to print here, but for more information go to the web site quoted above to find out how much can be recycled and what happens to all our waste. If we can recycle more of our waste we will help our environment and produce finance for our councils and some energy at little cost.

Cuckfield Dramatic Society

STEPPING UP TO THE MARK

When I first heard that **Cuckfield Dramatic Society** was planning to combine forces with **Dance with Emily** to stage Richard Harris' **Stepping Out** I was amazed. Having seen a professional production, I couldn't envisage how actors who didn't dance and dancers who didn't act could pull it off. I was wrong, they did, and created a great evening's entertainment.

Stepping Out is a light-hearted comedy that explores how a very diverse group of women and one man, attending a dance class, can come together, work through their various adversities and internal tensions and achieve something not one of them ever thought possible. None of the situational vignettes that we hear about each character is resolved but all are left on the side lines when the same individual characters become a team capable of a polished performance.

The credit for making this happen must go to the creative team. It was *Sophie Bradshaw*, the Creative Director, who had the dream of putting this production on in Cuckfield; *Harriet Sheldon*, the Director, who taught the dancers to act; and *Emily King*, the choreographer, who taught the actors to dance. On stage Sophie Bradshaw also plays Mavis Turner, the dance teacher, and was joined by the indomitable *répétiteur*, Mrs Fraser (*Jill Bowe*), miming to music recorded by the *Revd Michael Maine*.

Maxine, Vera, Sylvia, Andy, Dorothy, Rose and Lynne (*Caroline Denholm, Chrys Tarr, Louis Paton, Claire Atkins, Diane Barksfield, Michelle French and Izi Gaff*), together with the only male in the troupe, Geoffrey (*Simon King*) form the dance class struggling to emulate the easy grace of their mentor.

It was delightful to have Queens Hall full for this production, even though this probably contributed to the difficulty that some of the cast had in projecting their voices and many of the best lines being missed by the audience. However, amateur productions have to make the most of the resources that are available to them and CDS together with *Dance with Emily* certainly stepped up to the mark with this production.

FSW UPDATE

Dear Friends

Our practitioners are juggling a great number of cases now, and in some cases have no space left even on their waiting lists. In 2018/9 we supported 397 families intensively, and more than 2,000 people through our group sessions (compared with 298 families the previous year). The themes of financial hardship and mental health continue to be the most prevalent, and these issues can take a great deal of time to resolve.

We are preparing for an extremely busy couple of weeks. We will be manning a stand over the 3 days of the South of England Show and hope to speak to a large number of people and encourage them to support our work. TWO JULY ANNIVERSARIES TO TREASURE REMEMBERING GERARD MANLEY HOPKINS ...

The poet and Jesuit priest **Gerard Manley Hopkins** was born 175 years ago, on **28th July 1844** in Stratford – now East London. He was the eldest of probably nine children in a family that was both well off and artistically creative, as well as High Anglican.

His father Manley, who founded a marine insurance firm, saw nature as a book written by God, and this rubbed off on his son in one of his most famous poems, *God's Grandeur*, a poem which always feels so appropriate for the Pentecost season and the coming of the Spirit:

The world is charged with the grandeur of God.
It will flame out, like shining from shook foil;
It gathers to a greatness, like the ooze of oil
Crushed. Why do men then now not reck his rod?
Generations have trod, have trod, have trod;
And all is seared with trade; bleared, smeared with toil;
And wears man's smudge and shares man's smell: the soil
Is bare now, nor can foot feel, being shod.

And for all this, nature is never spent;
There lives the dearest freshness deep down things;
And though the last lights off the black West went
Oh, morning, at the brown brink eastward, springs —
Because the Holy Ghost over the bent
World broods with warm breast and with, ah, bright wings.

Hopkins was unpublished as a poet in his lifetime, but at Oxford he established a lifelong friendship with Robert Bridges, later Poet Laureate, who printed a collection of Hopkins' poems in 1918, to immediate acclaim.

In 1866 he converted to Roman Catholicism. Two years later he resolved to be a Religious, made a bonfire of his poems and wrote no poetry for seven years, returning to it only in

1875 with *The Wreck of the Deutschland*, based on a disaster in which nuns fleeing persecution were among the dead.

In 1884 he became a professor at University College Dublin, but felt isolated and ineffective. He died of typhoid in 1889. His last words were: "I am so happy. I loved my life."

.. and not forgetting the absent-minded William Spooner

At the other end of the linguistic spectrum lies **William Archibald Spooner**, university lecturer, dean and priest: born 175 years ago, on **22nd July 1844**, in London, he is known for his absent-mindedness. He sometimes mixed up the syllables of words, to comic effect in a way now known as 'spoonerisms'.

Spooner was an albino and suffered from defective eyesight. He studied at New College, Oxford, and then lectured there for 60 years in history, philosophy and divinity. He was well liked and respected, kind and hospitable. According to the economist, Sir Roy Harrod, Spooner exceeded all the heads of colleges at Cambridge or Oxford that he had known in 'scholarship, devotion to duty and wisdom'. Because he was so highly intelligent, it was suggested that his mind was occasionally too quick for his lips to follow – resulting in the unintended plays on words that made him famous. He died in 1930.

Many of the spoonerisms attributed to him are undoubtedly apocryphal, but it is fairly certain that in 1879 he gave out from the pulpit the first line of a hymn as ***Kinkering Kongs their titles take***. He is said to have disliked the reputation he gained for getting his words muddled, but at the same time he is believed on occasion to have made the errors deliberately: a particular masterpiece, if true, would have been his announcement during the notices at the beginning of a service that, ***if it is clamp and dammy, the social will be hauled in the hell by the church***.

HOUSE MARTINS - ***THE BUILDING BLOCKS OF SUMMER***

My summer is built from screams, cries, chatters and warbles. Walking around the Sussex countryside I'm always soaking up the sounds of migrant birds returning back home from their winter south of the Sahara. Each voice offers a familiar reassurance to me. Only when everything is back in its place can my summer begin.

One of the top tunes in my summer soundtrack is the sweet, bubbling twitter of the house martin. Shakespeare loved that sound too. To him they were 'the guest of summer'. From Macbeth's castle to cathedrals, country cottages and urban terraces these birds have historically been linked to our homes. They're as much of a feature of English architecture as the clay, bricks and uPVC they build their nests against.

House martins are surveyors, architects, bricklayers, decorators and homeowners rolled into one 19g two-tone ball of feathers. Give them a building site of a vertical surface under an overhang and they'll get to work. Each lumpy half-dome home, tucked snug under the eaves, is made of 1000 tiny mouthfuls of muddy bricks carried from the edge of a nearby puddle or stream. The birds construct each nest over 10 days, finally lining it with feathers to make it snug. They don't always build a brand-new nest; if they find a fixer-upper they'll renovate.

House martins are stereotypical builders. They constantly communicate with chirpy chatter, call down from the rooftops and while they're bent over building they reveal their pale rump. This white 'builder's bum' is a way of identifying the bird from that other summer eaves-dweller, the swallow.



They've shared our homes throughout history, but their numbers have suffered a massive decline in England with a worrying 18% nosedive over the past decade. Aerial insect food and changing weather patterns here, in Africa and on migration routes in between have had an effect. This loss should strike deep in the heart of every Sussex resident because our county's flag is made of six proud martlets. Martlet means 'little martin' but this heraldic bird may also represent the swift; that screaming summer visitor whose numbers are also in decline.

Either way you should consider yourself blessed if you are one of the lucky people who share your house with these incredible birds. Let's hope our county's martlets and our county flag are flying proudly under blue Sussex skies this July.

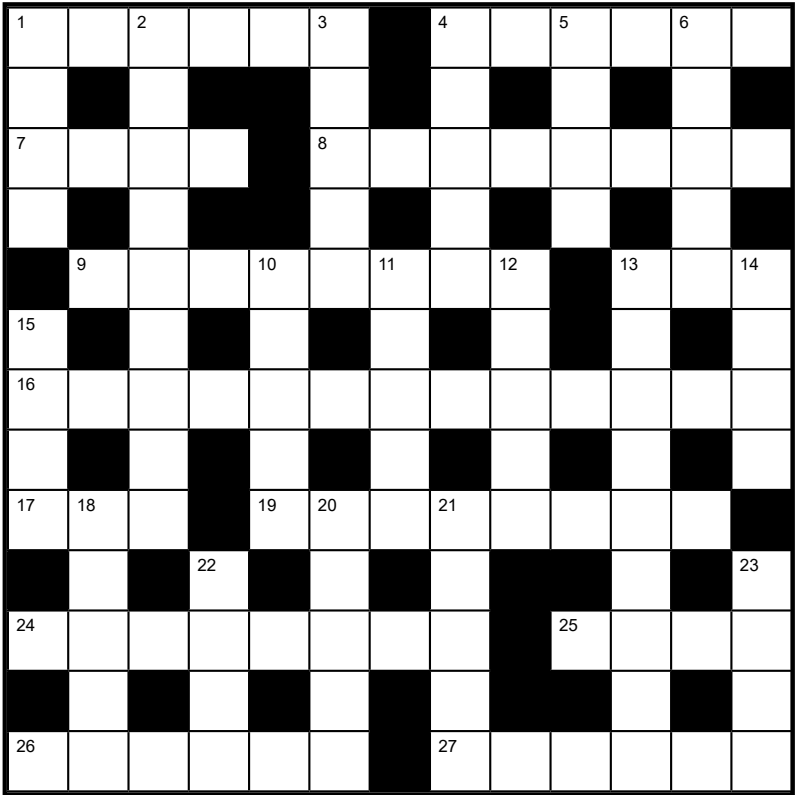
