A couple of weeks ago we celebrated the feast of Pentecost and the birth of the Christian Church, and this week we see the Church being firmly established in Antioch, the first church to embrace both Jews and Gentiles. It was Barnabas, whose feast day we celebrate this week, who was instrumental in welcoming the Gentiles and supporting and encouraging Paul, whom many regarded with fear and suspicion due to his previous involvement the persecution of the followers of Jesus. Barnabas, although not as well-known as some of the more prominent saints, is someone we can all aspire to. He is described as being a 'good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith' and is best known for being an encourager. He saw the potential in people, was generous with his possessions, showed great courage and rejoiced when others came to faith in Jesus. Today we give thanks for all those who hold us up, help us and share our journey, and we pray for the courage to stand alongside those in need and be a source of strength and encouragement to those we meet in our daily life. # Acts 11:19-end

Now those who were scattered because of the persecution that took place over Stephen travelled as far as Phoenicia, Cyprus, and Antioch, and they spoke the word to no one except Jews. But among them were some men of Cyprus and Cyrene who, on coming to Antioch, spoke to the Hellenists also, proclaiming the Lord Jesus. The hand of the Lord was with them, and a great number became believers and turned to the Lord. News of this came to the ears of the church in Jerusalem, and they sent Barnabas to Antioch. When he came and saw the grace of God, he rejoiced, and he exhorted them all to remain faithful to the Lord with steadfast devotion; for he was a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith. And a great many people were brought to the Lord. Then Barnabas went to Tarsus to look for Saul, and when he had found him, he brought him to Antioch. So it was that for an entire year they associated with the church and taught a great many people, and it was in Antioch that the disciples were first called 'Christians'.

At that time prophets came down from Jerusalem to Antioch. One of them named Agabus stood up and predicted by the Spirit that there would be a severe famine over all the world; and this took place during the reign of Claudius. The disciples determined that according to their ability, each would send relief to the believers living in Judea; this they did, sending it to the elders by Barnabas and Saul.

## Galatians 2: I-I0

Then after fourteen years I went up again to Jerusalem with Barnabas, taking Titus along with me. I went up in response to a revelation. Then I laid before them (though only in a private meeting with the acknowledged leaders) the gospel that I proclaim among the Gentiles, in order to make sure that I was not running, or had not run, in vain. But even Titus, who was with me, was not compelled to be circumcised, though he was a Greek. But because of false believers secretly brought in, who slipped in to spy on the freedom we have in Christ Jesus, so that they might enslave us— we did not submit to them even for a moment, so that the truth of the gospel might always remain with you. And from those who were supposed to be acknowledged leaders (what they actually were makes no difference to me; God shows no partiality)—those leaders contributed nothing to me. On the contrary, when they saw that I had been entrusted with the gospel for the uncircumcised, just as Pe-ter had been entrusted with the gospel for the circumcised (for he who worked through Peter making him an apostle to the circumcised also worked through me in sending me to the Gentiles), and when James and Cephas and John, who were acknowledged pillars, recognized the grace that had been given to me, they gave to Barnabas and me the right hand of fellowship, agreeing that we should go to the Gentiles and they to the circumcised. They asked only one thing, that we remem-ber the poor, which was actually what I was eager to do.

John 15: 12-17 This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

A thought: St Barnabas the Apóstle 11th June 2023 Joseph, but his friends called him 'Barnabas', 'son of encouragement', was admired for his gift of animating others. We see him engaged in that ministry in Acts at Antioch; the Gospel had, for the first time, been preached to Gentiles as well as Jews, and therefore, a new kind of church was emerging there, a group that included members of Jewish and non-Jewish backgrounds.

Barnabas was sent to Antioch by the apostles to assess what was happening there; he immediately recognised it as the work of the Lord and sided with this new development. He turned out to be right; it was indeed the work of the Lord.

God is always at work in new and creative ways among us, and it is a great gift to recognise divine in-spiration wherever it is to be found and to celebrate and encourage its effects. Therefore, he had the advantage of noticing where the Lord was working; this was the secret of him being a 'Barnabas'.

## A prayer for this time of Vacancy:

Send us your Holy Spirit at this time of change and uncertainty, to fill us with vision, energy and faith-fulness in prayer that we may be true to our calling to bring new life to our community; and guide with your heavenly wisdom those who are to choose a new priest for this Benefice, so that the one whom we receive may be a wise and gentle shepherd of your people, ready to serve us with joy, to build us up in faith, and to lead us by example, in loving obedience to your Son our Saviour, Jesus Christ.
