Reflection

Holy Cross Day reminds us of the deep love Jesus showed by dying on the cross. The cross, once a symbol of pain and shame, has become a sign of hope and salvation. Jesus gave His life so that we could be forgiven and live in peace with God. When we look at the cross, we remember that love is stronger than hate, and life is stronger than death. This day invites us to reflect on our own lives. Are we carrying our crosses with faith and courage? Are we helping others carry theirs? Jesus didn't run from suffering - He embraced it for our sake. We are called to do the same, trusting that God is with us. Let the cross be a reminder that we are never alone. In every struggle, Jesus walks beside us. His sacrifice gives us strength, and His love gives us purpose.

Almighty God, who in the passion of your blessed Son made an instrument of painful death to be for us the means of life and peace: grant us so to glory in the cross of Christ that we may gladly suffer for his sake; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

First Reading Numbers 21.4-9

The people complain; snakes and the bronze serpent

From Mount Hor they set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The

people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

Second Reading Philippians 2.6-11

Christ emptied himself that every knee should bow

Though he was in the form of God, he did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Gospel John 3.13-17

For God so loved the world ...

No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

Join Our Team - Part Time Verger / Caretaker - Holy Trinity Church, Cuckfield

We are looking for a friendly and reliable person to join us as Verger / Caretaker. This rewarding role is at the heart of our historic parish church, helping ensure it is always welcoming, safe, and ready for worship, community events, and visitors. The role includes preparing the church for services, assisting with concerts and festivals, supporting volunteers, and overseeing cleaning, security, and the general care of the building. It requires someone practical, organised, approachable, physically fit, and sympathetic to the ethos of the Church of England. This is a part-time role of 10 hours a week, worked flexibly (including some evenings and weekends). Pay is £13.00 per hour, reviewed after six months, with 33 days' holiday per year pro rata. Supporting the All Souls' Requiem - This year's All Souls' service taking place on Sunday 2nd November 6.00pm, will feature Durufle's beautiful Requiem sung by Cantores Memoriam, a choir especially assembled for the service this evening made up of highly trained singers, drawn from across Sussex, with experience in churches, cathedrals, and renowned ensembles. We also welcome a professional string orchestra with the music directed by Dr Joe Paxton and organ played by Fearghus Beauchamp. It will be a very special evening of prayer, remembrance, and music of the highest quality and will be followed by refreshments. Staging an event of this scale costs in the region of £3,500, and we are inviting members of the congregation to consider making a pledge of £200 towards the costs of engaging professional musicians and supporting the event. If you feel able to help in this way, please speak to Fr Daniel. Your generosity will allow us to continue offering worship that brings both beauty and comfort to our parish and wider community.

Fuse Youth Club - Volunteer Role - Our new youth club is about to get going on Friday evenings for secondary school aged children. We need volunteers support the safe and positive running of the club by supervising activities, engaging with young people, and helping create a welcoming environment. Tasks may include helping with sign-in, leading or assisting with games, serving food, and maintaining a safe space in line with safeguarding procedures.
